In October 1985, the Universal House of Justice addressed to the peoples of the world a statement—penetrating in its vision and far-reaching in its scope—regarding humanity's collective future, a letter that has come to be known as "The Promise of World Peace."

To mark the 30th anniversary of the release of this statement, the National Spiritual Assembly is delighted to announce that the Bahá'í Chair for World Peace at the University of Maryland, together with the Bahá'í International Community, will host a conference October 7–9, 2015, entitled "Global Transformations: Context and Analytics for a Durable Peace."

Highly acclaimed scholars and practitioners across many disciplines—three of whom are Bahá'ís—will address a broad and complex spectrum of current obstacles to global peace and security. Topics to be addressed cover a diverse range, from global governance to collective security, natural resources to biological determinism, and women's peace movements to responses to oppression. The forum will begin Wednesday evening at 7:00 p.m. with a presentation by Dr. Prudence Carter, Professor of Sociology at Stanford University, entitled "Equality Demands Empathy: Why Education Has to Be More Than a Private Good in an Unequal Society."
